In the absence of the nomination of a suitable senior ESCoE researcher, the ESCoE Academic Co-Director may him/herself assess the suitability of a submission for the ESCoE Discussion Paper Series or may send the paper to an appropriate ESCoE associate to seek his/her recommendation.

All submissions approved for inclusion in the ESCoE Discussion Paper Series are sent to the Office for National Statistics for possible comment.
